University Health Care Costs Rise Sharply; No Sign They'll Drop + High claims - Claims over

The University of Alaska has caught up with national trends in total and escalating health care costs, and that's not good news.

While the rest of the nation was experiencing significant cost increases; for health care coverage in FY00, the UA experience remained relatively steady, said Janet Jacobs, the university's executive director for Human Resources. "We now have dramatic increases that show no sign of stopping."

Jacobs said the four primary cost drivers and their relative impact on cost increases are:

- + Increased staff more employees and their dependents on the plan plus increased average number of claims per participant - higher use (48%)
- Increased average cost per claim - inflation in costs for medical and related services (24%)

In FY01 high claims primarily impacted the Traditional Plan which applies to UA employees who are members of a collective bargaining unit. Non-represented university employees are in the UA2000 Plan, and if high claims are deducted from the UA2000 plan, the plan achieves its original objectives for cost containment, Jacobs said. "This is good to know," she added, "but it doesn't change the numbers at the bottom of the page.

The graph shows summary numbers for FY98 through FY01, and FY02 data projections based on ten months of data. FY03 figures are projected.

Here are some quick comparisons between FY00 and

- Average inpatient expense per enrollee increased 54.3%.
- Medical expenses per enrollee increased 20.3%.

- Prescription drug-covered expense increased 30%.
- Rx cost per enrollee increased 22.3%.

"A dialogue has begun and will continue with all the university's constituency groups," Jacobs said. "On the **Move** will be one of many communication mechanisms for 'getting the word out' on how we are collectively addressing this issue."
