Executive Summary

This is a summary of a full prospectus (39 pages in length). The full prospectus is available upon request.

1. Relationship of the proposed program relative to the Educational mission of the University of Alaska and the MAU.

Responsiveness to State Needs: Alaska's rural oral health care needs remain largely unmet. Alaskan hygienists earning a BSDH can become commissioned officers in the Public Health Service and deliver oral health care in their home villages. The BSDH degree is also designed to articulate with Advanced Dental Hygiene Practitioner (ADHP) graduate degrees that are under development. The Advanced Dental Hygiene Practitioner is a proposed mid-level practitioner that can also help meet oral health care needs.

Increase the types of healthcare providers: The BSDH will prepare interested students to apply to the Advanced Dental Hygiene Practitioner programs.

Educational Quality: Most universities confer baccalaureate degrees in dental hygiene while UAA and UAF currently offer only Associate degrees. The BSDH will build on UAA's quality core education and will raise UAA's status by joining the ranks of other universities that confer BSDH degrees.

Workforce Training: The available pool of qualified dental hygiene faculty applicants is limited. With the addition of the UAF Dental Hygiene Program in 2007, the demand for faculty is even greater. The BSDH program will offer coursework in dental hygiene education to grow the pool of qualified faculty applicants. The baccalaureate program will also offer courses in restorative hygiene to teach the skills required for the new state certification.

UAA Healthcare Emphasis: As the designated UA healthcare campus, UAA is well positioned to take the lead in offering advanced education in dental hygiene.

2. History of the development of the proposed program.

In response to the Commission on Dental Accreditation's site visit in Fall 2007, a dental hygiene curriculum committee was established. This committee—composed of two full time faculty, one adjunct faculty, one current student, and one recent graduate—reviewed the curriculum of dental hygiene schools across the nation and recommended development of a Bachelor of Science, Dental Hygiene degree. The committee outlined the basic elements of the program, and members of the Alaska State Dental Hygiene Association were consulted to determine support for the program and to provide input on the degree format. Full time faculty then collaborated to develop the final degree requirements. The final degree requirements were approved by the Dental Programs Advisory Committee and

the various bodies of the UAA curriculum process. The full prospectus includes documentation from The American Dental Hygiene Association and the American Dental Education Association supporting baccalaureate-level degrees for dental hygienists. Also in the full prospectus are letters of support from the Alaska Dental Hygiene Association, the Dental Director of the Southcentral Foundation, and the UAA Dental Programs Advisory Committee.

3. Impact of the proposed program on existing UA programs, including the GER.

UAA Dental Hygiene AAS graduates currently complete 22 credits of GER courses. The remaining 15 credits are 3 quantitative skills, 3 fine arts, 6 humanities, and 3 integrative capstone or 5 general education courses outside the dental hygiene program. The small size of the dental hygiene program should not make a significant impact on GER courses which are offered in sufficient quantity that there is reserve capacity for the additional students.

4. State needs met by the proposed program.

- Legislation permitting restorative duties for dental hygienists was passed in May 2008. A three course sequence will meet certification requirements for these expanded duties. This is the only curriculum in Alaska being developed to meet this need.
- Alaska has critical oral health care needs that are exacerbated by a shortage of
 dentists moving into the state and the lack of a dental school. The BSDH degree is
 designed to articulate with developing out-of state graduate programs for the
 Advanced Dental Hygiene Practitioner (ADHP), a proposed mid-level dental
 professional that will be able to prescribe certain medications and perform basic
 restorative services such as simple extractions and tooth preparations for fillings.
- With two dental hygiene education programs (UAA and UAF) in the state, the need for qualified faculty is greater than before. This degree allows educational coursework in clinical teaching and educational methodology in an effort to increase the selection pool of qualified instructor applicants

5. Student opportunities, outcomes, and enrollment projections.

Graduates will be eligible for commission in the Public Health Service, for admission to graduate schools, and for teaching positions in dental hygiene programs. Initial student enrollment is projected be 10 students/year. This number may increase depending on interest. The program outcomes include:

- 1. Critically evaluate research studies relevant to dental hygiene.
- 2. Assess, plan, implement, and evaluate complex community oral health projects to diverse populations.

3. Perform advanced dental hygiene skills beyond the associate degree level, e.g. restorative functions and/or clinical instruction.

6. Faculty and staff workload implications.

The restorative courses will be taught by adjuncts. Recent curriculum revisions changed workloads making faculty available to teach some of the new curriculum. Some courses will be taught by adjuncts on an as-needed basis. The clinical practicum courses will replace independent studies already taught in a summer workload. The teaching practicum may be listed under 'other teaching' on the workloads. No additional staff are expected to be needed.

7. Describe the Fiscal Plan for the proposed program.

The courses will initially be taught by adjuncts and faculty overloads/summer assignments. The expenses in Table ES5.1 are for offering each course every year, and include the course materials/supplies and instructor salary using adjuncts and full-time faculty overloads/summer assignments. No additional expense is anticipated. The new revenue is based on new tuition and fee revenues. The college is committed to making up any shortfalls.
