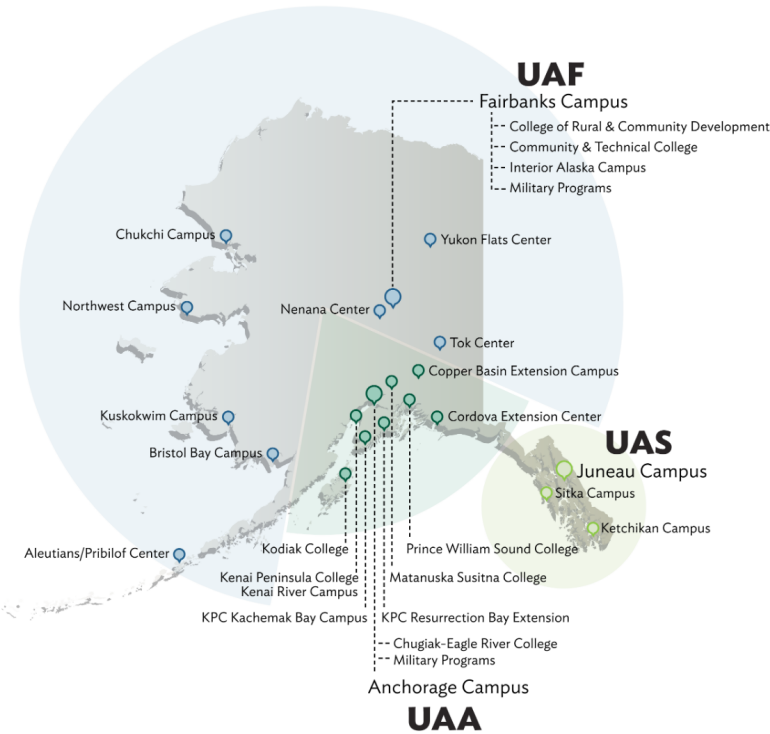


University of Alaska History
