Re: Interdisciplinary Bachelors of Arts Program Termination

The concept of the Interdisciplinary Bachelors of Arts degree began as a two-year collaborative effort between the University of Alaska Southeast's upper-administration and the School of Arts and Sciences. The goal was to create an interdisciplinary degree served by all departments. Following extensive degree planning by the Humanities and Social Science faculty, the IBA degree was sent to the University of Alaska Board of Regents and approved in June of 2020.

In September 2020, the IBA had no declared majors and none of the core courses required for the degree had been offered in the fall course schedule. Based on this data and Alaska's continuing fiscal challenges, UAS administration suspended admissions to the IBA program. Since no students were admitted to the IBA program, we have no institutional data by which to assess the popularity or efficiency of the degree. As a follow up to admissions suspension, the IBA Expedited Review Committee was charged by Chancellor Karen Carey with the analysis and feasibility of implementing the degree, including managing its staffing, advising, and curriculum.

In response to the charge and after careful review, the IBA Expedited Review Committee concluded in November of 2020 that recent reductions in faculty across the School of Arts and Sciences, whether from retirement or relocation, rendered the IBA degree deficient in all categories listed for review and unfeasible for delivery. The committee recommended suspending admissions to the IBA for one year and in that time, prioritize hiring new faculty to administer the degree. Or if IBA delivery proved unrealistic, prioritize supporting existing multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary degrees such as the BLA, the BA and BS awarding Program on the Environment, and prioritize the retention of faculty who serve those degrees. Similarly, the committee unequivocally supports the recently proposed BA in Indigenous Studies.

As of January 2022, no new faculty were hired or assigned to administer the Interdisciplinary Bachelor of Arts. Thus, this committee is recommending the degree be terminated.
